## Everglades Trail

Drive the Everglades Trail to explore the natural wonders of this international treasure. From Florida Bay north to the headwaters in Central Florida, you will find sites that provide accessible opportunities to enjoy the beautiful public lands of the Greater Everglades Ecosystem. This subtropical region is remarkable, with unique plants and wildlife and millions of acres of public lands – vital not only for nature, but for the water supply for South Florida.

Plan your adventures along the Everglades Trail according to your time and interests. Since the trail is not a specific route, you may tour for a day, weekend, or longer. You may want to spend your entire time at one site, or visit several a day.

Look for the Everglades Trail highway signs along the way directing you to the designated Everglades Trail nature sites. Each site will have a green-roofed kiosk, with interpretive signs on the Everglades and information about where you are within the ecosystem.



To better plan your time, you might contact individual sites for more information prior to your visit. Extending from the Kissimmee River through Lake Okeechobee and the Big Cypress Swamp to Florida Bay, the Everglades Trail provides you with the chance to see firsthand the Greater Everglades Ecosystem. Local, state, and federal agencies joined together to create this fun and educational opportunity for public enjoyment.

At nature sites along the Trail, canoeing, hiking, biking, boardwalks, and trails await you. Experience the Everglades on your own, or on tram or boat tours.

Each season offers different opportunities. While the summer can be hot and buggy and the winter cooler and drier, the rewards of discovery are possible year-round. Please remember to travel safely, bringing along drinks and snacks, bug spray, and clothing appropriate for South Florida's frequently changing weather. You may also find binoculars and field guide books useful tools for watching wildlife.

As you drive the Everglades Trail, listen to stories of wildlife and the history of the region on a companion Everglades Trail CD, narrated by **Charles Osgood**. A special bonus CD offers recordings of diverse musical interpretations by Florida artists, including two songs by Florida's most famous musician, **Jimmy Buffett**. Look for these CDs at sales outlets located at visitor centers along the Trail. Proceeds from CD sales support The Everglades Trail.

# Everglades Trail

These sites are gateways to Everglades adventures!

Each of these places offers an accessible outdoor opportunity for you to enjoy. Look for the green-roofed kiosks for more information. Along the Everglades Trail, you'll find museums and attractions featuring nature and culture in one of America's wildest places.

## ① Shingle Creek

Hunter's Creek Middle School  
13400 Town Loop Blvd., Orlando, FL 322837

Located within the hustle and bustle of urban Orlando, Shingle Creek provides a good look at the initial headwaters of the Everglades ecosystem. It's a great place to bike, hike, fish, kayak, canoe, and see wildlife. Canoe boat ramp available. Open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. 7 days a week. Best to call ahead. ## ② The Nature Conservancy's Disney Wilderness Preserve

2700 Scrub Jay Trail, Kissimmee, FL 34759

This 12,000-acre preserve, located at the historic headwaters of the Everglades, is home to hundreds of species of wildlife and one of the last undeveloped lakes in Central Florida. Interpretive exhibits and 2 1/4-mile hiking trail are available. Open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. 7 days a week. Best to call ahead. ## ③ Lake Kissimmee State Park

In addition to camping, hiking, backpacking, horseback riding, and boating opportunities, Lake Kissimmee State Park is also a living history site on the weekends and holidays, Oct. 1 – May 1. ## ④ Prairie Lakes Unit, Three Lakes Wildlife Management Area

## ⑩ Arthur R. Marshall Loxahatchee National Wildlife Refuge

Refuge visitors can enjoy fishing, boating, hiking, and bird watching. The Headquarters Area offers a visitor center, observation tower, fishing platform, canoe trail, and nature trails. Boat ramps are available at Headquarters Area, Hillsboro Recreation Area, and at 20-Mile Bend. ## ⑪ Everglades Wildlife Management Area

Alligator Alley I-75 Rest Area at Mile Marker 36

In addition to restrooms and a boat ramp, the Everglades Wildlife Management Area has wildlife exhibits and an observation platform. Wading birds are frequently spotted in the sawgrass marsh – so bring a camera! ## ⑫ Biscayne National Park

## ⑬ Everglades National Park - Ernest F. Coe Visitor Center

## ⑯ DuPuis Management Area

The DuPuis Management Area on the northern edge of the original Everglades presents opportunities to ride horses, camp, hunt, and walk along an interpretive trail. ## ⑮ Big Cypress National Preserve

Visitors to the Preserve will enjoy the scenic drives, bird watching, a swamp walk, canoeing, and biking on their own or on a ranger-led trip. ## ⑯ Everglades National Park - Gulf Coast Visitor Center

## ⑰ Fakahatchee Strand Preserve State Park

A self-guided boardwalk offers a leisurely walk through original growth cypress trees. The more adventurous can hike approximately 60 miles of trails. ## ⑲ Rookery Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve

With 110,000 acres, this preserve provides opportunities to explore natural areas and cultural history. The Environmental Learning Center features exhibits, daily programs, nature trails, viewing area, guided kayak tours, art gallery, gift shop, and special events. ## ⑳ Florida Panther National Wildlife Refuge

## ㉑ Seminole Ah-Tah-Thi-Ki Museum

HC-61, Box 21-A, Clewiston, FL 33440

A one-mile raised boardwalk through a beautiful cypress dome leads to an authentic Living Village depicting Seminole life at the turn of the century.
